Conversation Topic/Bring your Ideas: The Institute is partnering with the Provost's Office Core Curriculum Race and Social Justice Teaching Fellows to create strategies to institutionalize race and social justice curriculum and teaching across the disciplines: Dr. Andrea Mays, Women Studies, Dr. Carmen Samora, Chicana and Chicano Studies, Dr. Emma Trentman, Arabic, UNM, will start our discussion with brief opening remarks. Dr. Leola Tsinnajinnie, Native American Studies, and co-Chair of Diversity Council Curriculum Committee as well as Provost Teaching Fellow is unable to join, but she has been also been coordinating these efforts in the Provost office. Dr. Kiran Katira, co-chair, Diversity Council, Curriculum Committee has also been supporting departments who are interested in advancing race and social justice curriculum.

Conversation Goals/Deliverables:

- Cultivate concrete strategies, anticipate challenges and leverage opportunities for institutionalizing race and social justice interdisciplinary curriculum, teaching and pedagogy across the disciplines
- resubmit Form B to Institute a catalog course race and social justice interdisciplinary insights undergrad/grad course in Spring 2020 that could be crosslisted with others across colleges.
- Establish Mentoring Program for Faculty, Staff as well as a Grad Student and Undergraduates interested in pursuing the interdisciplinary undergraduate race and

social justice praxis. Collaborate with Community Mentors and Organizations that Advance Race and Social Justice Praxis.

Discussion Questions:

- a.) How can we co-create interdisciplinary syllabi for race and social justice? What other disciplines and key readings and enduring insights are missing from the interdisciplinary syllabi on race and social justice (attached and also available on race.unm.edu, under "ethnic studies"). Note: This syllabi was produced in 2016 by over 20 Institute affiliated faculty from a variety of disciplines. Ideally each discipline should list 4-8 key readings. All types of key contributions are welcome: theory, methods, pedagogy, etc.. Please email: nlopez@unm.edu.
- b.) What are the strategies, challenges and opportunities for cultivating system-level change that include critical approaches to race and social justice as part of required degree requirements across departments and colleges? How do we created sustainable and enduring systems-level change (e.g., student learning outcomes and assessments; hiring priorities, academic program review self-study process, annual review of faculty, chairs, deans, etc.)?
- c.) Curriculum for whom and for what? Whose knowledge counts? Who has academic freedom to teach race and social justice? Is it part of degree requirements at the department level or at the university level or is it an elective? How can a *focus on power relations, structural inequalities and resistance* in knowledge production, epistemologies, ontologies, and pedagogy reveal new understandings about *ethical versus aesthetic academic justice* in higher education?

Please review, add and edit the attached readings and bring your suggestions to the meeting or email them to nlopez@unm.edu. Our goal is to list 4-8 key readings per discipline. We will keep updating this syllabus on race.unm.edu. It was rejected by the Curriculum Committee of the College of Arts and Sciences in Fall 2016 (Form B RACE 400/500, due to lack of funding, but we hope to resubmit in Fall 2020. In the meantime we will share this could be shared widely via the internet (race.unm.edu) until we can find of creating a stable numbered course in the catalog course that could be cross listed with multiple departments.
