

The Department of Sociology at the University of New Mexico invites applications for the newly established Maxine Baca Zinn Endowed Professorship to begin in August 2019. For this full-time, tenured position, we seek applications from sociology of gender scholars at the associate or early professor level. Applicants must have a conferred PhD in sociology or other related field along with a record of employment that would support appointment at the rank of associate or full professor. For best consideration, all application materials must be received by October, 1st 2018.

Applicants should provide evidence of an established independent research agenda and publication record that engages debates and/or contributes to theoretical, empirical, and/or methodological innovations in the sociology of gender. In particular, we are looking for candidates whose research 1) links gender to other mechanisms of inequality like race/ethnicity, social class, and sexuality; and/or 2) overlaps with the department's core research areas (health, race/ethnicity, criminology, and social movements). The new faculty member will teach undergraduate and graduate courses in the sociology of gender, supervise students on masters and doctoral committees, and contribute to core courses at the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Minimum and Preferred Criteria

Minimum

- a) Ph.D. in sociology or closely related field by date of application.
- b) A record of employment that supports appointment at the rank of associate or full professor; and
- c) Evidence of primary specialization in the sociology of gender.

Preferred

- a) Evidence of an active, independent research agenda and publication record that engages key debates and/or contributes to theoretical, empirical, and/or methodological innovations in the sociology of gender;
- b) Academic preparation and demonstrated ability to teach undergraduate courses in gender and contribute to other core courses in the undergraduate program (these include introduction to sociology, sociological theory, and sociological methods);
- c) Demonstrated ability to teach graduate level courses in the sociology of gender; capacity to chair comprehensive doctoral exams in the sociology of gender; and experience supervising master's theses or Ph.D. dissertations; and
- d) A demonstrated commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion, and student success, as well as working with broadly diverse communities.

Applicants should pay extra attention to the "Special Instructions to Applicants," which detail all of the required elements that must accompany the

application. Applications must include a letter describing the applicant's qualifications as they relate to the minimum and preferred criteria (e.g., research agenda, teaching experience, etc.); a current curriculum vita (please include email address and telephone number); and two samples of scholarly writing (submitted as one PDF document). Applicants who are appointed to a UNM faculty position are required to provide an official certification of successful completion of all degree requirements prior to their initial employment with UNM. After initial review of applications, the search committee may also request that select applicants have at least two, but no more than three letters of recommendation submitted by academic mentors or colleagues. For best consideration, all required application materials must be received by October 1st, 2018. We can only consider complete applications. The position will remain open until filled.
